
Coffee Morning for new members held on Monday July 16th



Mr Nick Barratt - Genealogy

It was something of a 'nail biter' in getting Nick Barratt to the Plaza in time for the July meeting, as he had agreed to travel from his home in South West London by train, to be met at Kettering station. Unfortunately, the train was delayed, but all turned out satisfactorily and he was welcomed in with just a few minutes to spare.

To many of the audience Nick Barratt was already a familiar figure, mainly from the TV show "Who do you think you are?" of which he was a primary presenter. Apart from this, he has many other accomplishments to his name, including be-



Nick imparted much information relating to the TV show, for which he is perhaps most widely known and advised that the programme had in part been modelled around the lives of well-known personalities including soprano Lesley Garrett CBE, wild life specialist and former 'Goodie', Bill Oddie, Jeremy Clarkson, Ian Hislop and Jeremy Paxman. Each edition of the programme cost approximately £140K and took up to 6 months to complete.

The original concept for the TV show was based on similar lines to another successful programme,

Time Team, where, within the format, a layman asks questions of the experts as the information available is discovered and analysed. "Who Do You Think You Are?" regularly had 3 to 4 million viewers, many just fascinated to learn more of the lives of the celebrities involved. The subjects of each programme were accustomed to working in front of the camera in an environment that may have overawed those not accustomed to being in the public eye.

For those wishing to investigate their own heritage Nick illustrated how quickly, and in the space of just a few generations, important information could be lost by posing the question to the audience: how many could name all eight of their great grandparents? He continued with suggestions where family information could be researched, including modern websites, explaining that local libraries frequently allow free access to some sites. The National Archives at Kew also provide free access to records that go back centuries, from parish records and land sales among other important documents.

There is public access to the census records going back from 1911 to 1841 and military service records are a treasure trove of useful information. The next national census in the UK, which occurs every ten years, will be in 2021.

Nick gave a thought-provoking moment to the audience when he asked who owned the personal data which individuals may put on to social media sites, when it is known that some organisations 'harvest' information to be used for their own purposes. It appears that such data, when placed on the internet, may not belong to the individual anymore.

Nick's style of delivery is very relaxed and he made his presentation apparently without reference to notes. At the end of the presentation he was open to questions and many in the audience took advantage of the time to ask some of Nick's past and it was divulged that his ancestors came to England as Huguenot refugees in the 18th century. As for 'skeletons in the closet', Nick's latest book 'The Forgotten Spy' tells the story of his great uncle, who was Russian Premier Stalin's first 'mole' in Whitehall!

Susan Lees An Unfinished Dream — Lyveden

The talk covers the development of the gardens at Lyveden, which are one of the few surviving 17th century gardens in the UK. They are not only an historic monument but a Grade 1 listed park – so a very special place. Susan will also look at how Sir Thomas Tresham's beliefs informed his work and the effect of the Gunpowder Plot on the family.



The National Trust acquired the site in 1922 and its fortunes since then

have seen many changes, including employing a 'Hermit' to look after the site in the 1950s!



Since retiring, Susan has been Secretary and Chairman of the local (East Northants) National Trust Association and subsequently part of a team of five 'wrinkly job-sharers' running the Visitor Centre every day from March to November each year.

Science and Technology Group

The group is open to anyone who is interested in and curious about all aspects of science, technology and mathematics.

We now have twenty members and have room for four more.

We meet on the third Monday afternoon of each month from 2 until 4.



Our venue is the Baptist Church in Sackville Street, Thrapston and we each pay £4 each quarter which covers the hall hire and coffee or tea and biscuits. Our programme cycle comprises two member's talks and one visit repeated throughout the year. This year we've had talks on Humour and Happiness, Cognitive-perceptual senses, Women in Science and Bees; future talks include Humphrey Davy and Pigmentation. We have visited Peterborough Energy Recovery Facility, the Shuttleworth collection and Church's Shoe Factory. Our next visit is to the Mini Factory, Oxford in November. Last year we visited Bletchley Park, the Whipple Museum and The British Transport Museum.

We also attend Cambridge Society for the Application of Research lectures at Churchill College www.csar.org.uk. They're usually monthly on Monday evenings from October to June at 7.30 and we leave Thrapston at about 6.30, sharing cars. They are free but a donation of £5 is encouraged, or you may become a member at £35 or less. Usually about six or seven of us attend these.

Members of the group are encouraged to run one of our sessions; it's not compulsory and you may opt to organise a visit instead. The main thing is that you enjoy coming to the group and contribute as little or as much as you feel happy with.

Science and Technology – Visit to Church's Shoe Factory in Northampton

What an amazing visit! Fourteen of our members met at 1.30 in the Committee Room and left the factory

shop at 5. In between we were guided enthusiastic and knowledgeable employally every step of the 250 plus manual operweeks to produce a pair of the world-This technique allows for refurbishment

through the factory by two wonderfully ees. They explained and showed us virtuations which take an average of eight renowned Goodyear constructed shoes. and as their website states; 'even the

most worn pair will come back looking like new.... some models have been around for over a century' and we were shown shoes undergoing refurbishment that had been made in the 60s.



The story of Church's began in the late 1600s when a lone Northampton man called Stone Church began making shoes. The factory now employs over 300 people and it still has a real family feel. It's now owned by Prada who are clearly investing a huge amount into the company, with an enormous building expansion planned that will increase the manufacture of women's shoes and handbags (YES!!)

Our tour began in the leather store with crocodile, horse and calf skins, then progressed through the very noisy machine rooms into the sole crafting area that included the application of deconstructed cork and glue and stitching. The employees were incredibly skilled and friendly, happily answering our questions and demonstrating the various stages of the manufacture.

It was great to see that all Church's shoes are still designed and manufactured in this busy industrial corner of Northampton by expert shoemakers who have huge pride in their work and I felt it was a rare privilege to be welcomed into the factory. We were even each given a beautiful Church's apron as a souvenir - perfect for the barbecue!

Many, many thanks to Church's for a wonderful afternoon; we'll be back to the factory shop soon....
