

A Tribute to Les Dawson - Mr Mike Leonard

The April meeting saw a welcome return to Thrapston of Mike (following from his previous talk on School Holiday Fiascos) with an excellent presentation on the late, and sadly missed, entertainer Les Dawson.





He went on to describe the main events in Les's extraordinary life that saw him rise from being a 'slum kid' to his appearance as 'Top of the Bill' in the 1971 Royal Command Performance at the London Palladium. Eventually he was voted by his fellow entertainers into the position of 'King Rat', among the highest accolades in show business.

Les was from a humble background, born in March 1931 into an impoverished inner city area of Manchester called Collyhurst. He attended the local primary school, where it was first discovered that he could write short stories that were of interest to his young peers. This was the very start of a career that included the writing of some 15 books, many of which were of a humourous nature.

His first mentor was a teacher at his secondary school named Mr Hetherington who, after punishing him for not paying attention in class, paid him a supreme compliment when he said that Les had the qualities to be a fine writer.



Mike disclosed an interesting insight into the Dawson career path, from leaving school at 14 years old to join the local Co-op, followed by an unsuccessful spell as an apprentice electrician. Eventually, Les was called up to do his National Service in the British Army where he served two and a half years, basic training at Catterick Camp leading eventually to a posting in Germany.

On leaving military service he tried Professional Boxing but was not good enough to make a career and was frequently knocked out. This was followed by a spell in Paris where he worked as a pianist in a striptease club that also served the local population as a brothel. His many jobs included a newspaper reporter for a local paper in Bury, Lancashire.

Mike played extracts of Les's piano performances with incorrect notes, changing tempos and familiar off key phases whilst his audience continued singing along following the musical score properly. It invoked many memories in our audience and hearty laughter rolled around the Plaza.

Les Dawson was a regular performer on our TV screens in the 70s, 80s and early 90s since being encouraged to appear on Hughie Green's talent show 'Opportunity Knocks' by his first wife Meg. Sadly Meg contracted cancer and passed away in 1986 leaving Les devastated.

Later, Les met a young lady, Tracey, who served him drinks at his local hotel and a friendship developed leading to a romance and the couple were married in 1989. Sadly they could only enjoy two years of married life before Les suffered a severe heart attack whilst undergoing a health check at the local hospital and died.

Coincidentally Mike used to visit the same hotel every year where he played bridge. He secured a meeting with Tracey, with the assistance of the manager of the hotel and when he spelled out his admiration for Les and his work and told her that he wished to prepare a talk on Les Dawson he was delighted to receive her full approval and assistance with his research, leading to the fine presentation we enjoyed at our meeting.
