

Hunters In The Sky (Raptors)

Jennifer is Director of Studies for Wildlife at Akkadium College and her talk centred on birds of prey, otherwise referred to as raptors.

Jennifer began by summarising their shared physical characteristics, such as their binocular vision, sharp talons, hooked beak and, of



course, their speed. She explained the two main classifications, falconiformes and strigiformes. The former applicable to eagles, hawks and falcons and the latter to owls. Supported by overhead slides, she described their behaviour and habitats, explaining that, on grouse moors, they are an enemy of man. We learnt that the peregrine falcon has the ability to reach a height of over 3000 feet and hurtle down touching speeds of 200mph, thus establishing it as the fastest living creature on the planet.

She talked about the various species of owls, hawks and vultures but explained that the osprey was one-of-kind. The latter, previously in declining numbers together with the Red Kite, have now been given a new stimulus by conservationists. Some species have been declining due to changes in land use and destruction of their habitats. This includes the impact of herbicides, lack of hedging, deforestation and commercial development.

Jennifer continued with a look into ancient history, showing a map, where falconry was first used. A photo was shown of a 2700 year old stone carving of a falcon handler. This was discovered at a palace, in what is now known as Syria, by the English archaeologist Austin Henry Layard. Falconry later spread throughout the East to China, India, then to Greece, Turkey, Bulgaria, Sicily, the rest of Europe and in the 5th century, to England.

Jennifer engaged the audience by asking people's thoughts in response to various questions, such as how to describe falconry. Various dictionary definitions followed, resulting in "the hunting of live quarry by a trained bird of prey". There followed a description of the necessary kit to handle and train falcons. The hood, it was explained, was to keep the bird from being distracted in noisy environments, the bird keeping calm as if it were asleep in the dark.

Rachel Hands, in 1486, wrote a treatise on hawking and hunting in which she outlined the social hierarchy of the users of hunting birds. Various birds were assigned to be used depending upon your social

status. For example, if you were a servant, you were expected to use a kestrel for hunting, but a baron would use a buzzard. Jennifer showed a long list of those who were allowed to use each kind of bird. This was extracted from Rachel's book called 'English Hawking And Hunting - The Boke Of St. Albans'. It has been reproduced from that period and is currently available from Amazon. It was interesting to learn that Henry VIII was keen on falconry. In addition, Jennifer pointed out that there are references to falconry in Shakespeare's plays. Jennifer, in conclusion, emphasised how



falconry has been part of the fabric of our society throughout the ages and continues to the present day.

A well delivered talk, I'm sure enjoyed by all, which ended with 'raptorus' applause.

(Sorry. I couldn't resist it.)





If you are unable to collect them at the Plaza and cannot arrange for someone to do so on your behalf, then please contact Polly (R 625 181) as soon as possible.


Please note: if you are unable to use your tickets, please return them so that they may be passed to other members.
