Review of the 17th September Plaza Presentation Magic & Music Halls - Dave Moylan

It was almost like the first day back at school after a long, long holiday and there was a certain perceptible nervousness on just how the morning would pan out with our first Plaza meeting in so many months.

We were doing things differently and the 'toe was definitely in the water' testing the temperature but we needn't have worried as our loyal members filed in and the air was filled with chatter as they sought refreshments and found their seats with many taking the opportunity to renew their membership.

Derby based Dave Moylan started his presentation in complete silence with an illusion whereby he produced a white serviette and carefully folded it then set fire to the end only to open the paper out a minute later to reveal it was totally undamaged and following this he crafted the paper into a long stemmed rose to our total amazement.

With his opening completed the silence was broken and he picked up his guitar to lead the audience into a song based on making coffee in which we were encouraged to participate shouting the word Oi! At the end of the chorus line.

Dave told us of his love and admiration of the comedians and performers from the latter days of the music halls and the golden age of radio through the 40s & 50s. It was a time when many of the artists would relate their comedy in rhyming fashion. Referring to a performer named Billy Bennet who was active on the comedy circuit just after the First World War and accompanying himself on the guitar he recited a very humorous rendition of 'A Sailor's Farewell to his Horse'. Quite apart from being very funny it was quite a feat of memory to get through the piece without stuttering.

His routine continued with reminiscences of the comedians who made it on radio to entertain us before TV was so widely available to the public and with familiar names such as Tommy Handley, Tommy Trinder, Al Read and Jimmy Clitheroe among many others.

Interspersing his performances on the guitar and songs with unfathomable illusions he certainly gave excellent entertainment value. He is a master of regional accents and it appears that some funny stories are enhanced for instance in a West Midlands accent although just how 'politically correct' this is in these enlightened times I could not hazard a guess.

Dave performed an excellent rendition of the George Formby song 'If Women Like Men, Like Men Like Those, why don't Women Like Me'? Looking around the room as he played it was noticeable just how many feet were tapping along to the tune, a sure sign that the audience are enjoying the performance.

Later in the show we were introduced to Marcel The Mind Reading Mouse and using an active little mouse puppet and enlisting a lady in the audience the mouse 'apparently' and no doubt with a fair bit of help, wrote a number onto a piece of paper that matched the number thought of by the audience member.

Telling all that Liverpool was a source of much in the comedy world he told a string of jokes in the 'Scouse' accent that he called his homage to this Northern city and certainly left us laughing.

Dave remains the resident Magician at Warwick Castle where he has performed for 25 years and we are delighted that he has been booked to return to Thrapston for our Christmas social later this year on 17th December. We are assured of another 'side splitting' experience.

Berry Bakewell Cake

Ingredients

150g Unsalted Butter/Stork

150g Golden Caster Sugar

150g Ground Almonds

150G Self Raising Flour

3 Medium Eggs

2 tbsp Whole Milk


1/2 tsp Vanilla Extract

250g Berries(125g Blueberries/Raspberries)

25-50g Flaked Almonds

1 tbsp lcing Sugar

- 1) Preheat the oven to 180C/160C Fan/350F and grease a 8"/20cm cake tin
- 2) Add your Butter, Sugar, Flour, Ground Almonds, Eggs, Milk and Vanilla to mixer and beat till smooth.
- 3) Spread half of the mixture on the bottom of the tin and then spread the berries on top of the first half. Then spread the rest of the mixture on top.
- 4) Sprinkle the cake with the flaked almonds and bake in the oven for 50 minutes or until a skewer comes out clean.
- 5) Leave to cool on a wire rack and sprinkle with the icing sugar—serve.




Lockdown


